Introduction. It is my pleasure to present the Annual Secretary's Report for the Rotary Club of Cessnock for the 2024 2025 year. This report highlights the club's activities, achievements, and contributions to the community. I would like to extend my gratitude to President Helen Rose, our sponsors, the Board, members and friends of Rotary for their dedication and commitment throughout the year.

Membership Report. As of 30 June 2024, the Rotary Club of Cessnock had 11 active members. Over the past year, we were pleased to welcome 4 new members, with an additional 3 members set to be inducted during tonight's Changeover Dinner. These new additions bring fresh energy, ideas, and enthusiasm to our club. While we celebrated growth, we also farewelled 2 members during the year due to personal and professional commitments. As of 12 June 2025, our membership will stand at 16 active members. Attendance throughout the year remained strong, with an average meeting attendance rate of 74%, reflecting a high level of engagement and commitment among our members.

Meetings & Events. Our regular meetings continued to be held on Thursday at Cessnock Leagues Club. Throughout the year, we hosted a variety of guest speakers, including Mayor Danial Watton, Michelle Johnson & Ruth Goodwin who shared valuable insights on topics ranging from community development to environmental sustainability. Special events such as the Effie O'Neil Debate and our annual Changeover Dinner, were well-attended and contributed to the vibrant fellowship within the club.

Club Projects & Initiatives. This year, the Rotary Club of Cessnock remained actively involved in numerous service projects, reinforcing our commitment to the community. Key initiatives included:

- Environmental Projects Aligned with President Helen's vision, we engaged in roadside clean-ups
- **Youth Programs** Supported initiatives such as Cessnock Interact Club and our Rotary short term exchange student, Payton Burke from Mount View High School who went to Germany.

This year was a milestone for our Interact Club, as they were honoured with the **Junior Citizen of the Year** at the Australian Day Ceremony hosted by Cessnock City Council as a testament to their hard work, leadership and dedication to service.

Introduction. As Treasurer of the Rotary Club of Cessnock, I am proud to present the financial contributions made during the 2024–2025 fiscal year. By the end of May 2025, our total contributions reached \$34,789. These funds have supported a diverse range of international and local initiatives, including Rotary's key programs such as RYPEN (Rotary Youth Program of Enrichment), ShelterBox, Rotary Foundation projects, and various community service efforts.

Through the generosity of our members, supporters, and sponsors, we have been able to deliver meaningful outcomes across education, health, youth development, and community resilience. Our commitment to "Service Above Self" continues to drive impactful change, both here in Cessnock and beyond.

Please note, we have also committed to further donations to be made, including \$1,000 for the supply and installation of Peace Poles in local schools, \$2,000 to support the Umoja Orphanage in Kenya and the replanting of garden beds at Cessnock West Public School

Financial Summary The club continues to operate on a cash basis.

As we approach the end of the financial year, our cash position remains strong. Total cash at bank as of 30 May 2025 is \$47,141

- \$14,580 in the Community Account
- \$12,314 in the Club Account
- \$1,964 in the Dream Cricket Account
- \$18,283 held in a Term Deposit

This financial stability ensures we are well-positioned to continue supporting vital projects and initiatives in the year ahead.

Donations This year, we allocated \$14,368 towards various charitable causes. These contributions support local and international programs that promote health, safety, and well-being.

Support for Education A significant portion of our contributions, totalling \$9,124 was dedicated to education, ensuring students have access to opportunities for growth and excellence:

Ongoing Programs As at the end of May 2025 \$11,297 was spent on our ongoing community programs, ensuring the continuity of important local initiatives:

- \$7,568 Free weekly breakfast & lunch for those in need in our community
- \$2,322 Free weekly sausage sizzle at Cessnock Police Citizens Youth Club
- \$907 Free weekly Scone Time for those that may feel isolated or are new to the area
- \$500 towards the Bike Program, supporting the repair and servicing of donated bicycles that are gifted to local families in need. *This program has now concluded*.

These programs provide essential support to young people, social engagement opportunities for seniors, and critical assistance to those in need, reinforcing our commitment to a vibrant and inclusive community.

Grants Received for 2024–2025

A total of \$9,500 was received in grants for the financial year 2024–2025, allocated as follows:

- **\$7,500** Feeding the Needy
- **\$1,500** Support for PCYC
- **\$500** Bike Program

Conclusion Our total contributions of \$34,789 reflect our dedication to making a positive impact across various sectors. Through continued community support and financial stewardship, we aim to sustain and expand these initiatives in the coming years.

A significant challenge this year was the reduction in our Bunnings BBQ opportunities, with our club being offered only five BBQs, a fraction of what we had previously relied upon. This shortfall in expected revenue required us to diversify our fundraising efforts to continue supporting our projects. To compensate, we successfully hosted a range of fundraising events, including:

- **High Tea:** A sophisticated afternoon that brought together community members for tea, treats, and fundraising to erect Peace Poles at local schools.
- **Trivia Night:** A fun-filled evening that challenged teams while raising vital funds for the Cessnock Volunteer Rescue Heavy Vehicle Fund.
- **Elegant White Picnic:** A stylish outdoor event that strengthened our club's presence while generating much-needed revenue to fund local high school students attending the Rotary Youth Program of Enrichment (RYPEN).
- Cessnock Air Show Food Stall: A fantastic opportunity to raise funds while serving food to event attendees.
- **Australian Postie Bike Grand Prix 2025:** An exciting and unique event that is held in Cessnock each year.

In addition to our fundraising efforts, we also focused on fellowship and social connection by hosting several memorable gatherings:

- A series of social events at Marthaville, providing members and friends with a chance to come together in a relaxed setting.
- A picnic at Pokolbin Park, where we enjoyed old-fashioned picnic games and great company in a picturesque location.
- Two fantastic outdoor lunches at Rotarian John's property, which were well attended and thoroughly enjoyed by all.

Our ongoing programs have also continued to make a significant impact:

- **Feeding the Needy:** Now in its fourth year, this initiative provides a hot breakfast and a three-course lunch every Wednesday to those in need.
- **Scone Time:** Also in its fourth year, this weekly Friday gathering at Marthaville offers a welcoming environment for those who may be lonely or isolated in the community.
- Friday Night Sausage Sizzle at PCYC: This ongoing effort supports PCYC's Unites program, fostering positive community engagement.

Despite the initial challenge of reduced Bunnings BBQs, our club rose to the occasion, demonstrating creativity and dedication in maintaining our fundraising and fellowship efforts. These events and initiatives would not have been possible without the tireless work of our members, our Friends of Rotary, and the support of the wider community.

Cessnock Rotary has been involved in the local PCYC family night for 18months, providing a sausage sizzle each Friday Evening. It has grown from humble beginnings to a regular crowd, where we can give away 120 sausages each time. The children are often regulars and look forward to the interactions and the sausages. It is a great project providing a source of food to our most vulnerable children in our community.

Interact has been running for approx. 18 months with the support of Cessnock Rotary. Stacy Jacobs who works at Cessnock High School is the driving force behind this successful club.

We've proudly supported students from Cessnock High School to attend RYPEN. Last year, Payton successfully completed a short-term youth exchange to Germany. This year, two students have been accepted into the long-term youth exchange program, Draygan will be heading to Japan, and Sophie to Finland. We wish them all the best for their exchange journeys in 2026. .

We have also supported the Cessnock Mayoral Scholarship Awards since it was started. This year President Helen and George Koncz presented the award to Ebony Cheal.

Now in its 23rd year, the Mayoral Scholarship Program has awarded 277 local students across the Cessnock Local Government Area with a combined total of \$693,000 since it began in 2002. This year, thanks to the generous support of local sponsors, Council awarded 15 scholarships each valued at \$2,500.
