## SCIENCE AND ENGINEERING CHALLENGE



Thursday 28th Aug was the State Final of the 25th Year of The Science and Engineering Challenge at Newcastle University for students from NSW schools.

Congratulations to all the students and a special mention to the students from Emmaus college who won the State Final today.

The Science and Engineering Challenge (SEC) is a nationwide STEM outreach program, established by the University of Newcastle in Australia in 2000, to inspire students in years 5-10 to pursue STEM careers through hands-on, practical activities. The program grew from information nights in rural areas and was a collaborative effort between the University and Rotary clubs, with the first SEC event held in 2000. The SEC has become a significant national program, expanding across states and involving over 500,000 students and 3,600 volunteers in its first 25 years





### SCIENCE AND ENGINEERING CHALLENGE 2025



## GUEST SPEAKER BRIAN MORGAN



We had the privilege of hearing from Brian Morgan, who shared his incredible adventure trekking to Everest Base Camp earlier this year with 13 others, average age 67 and the eldest being 80.

The team set out in April 2025, facing freezing nights at, minus 18°C, sleeping two to a tent, and going without showers or baths. Food was often challenging, and not everyone was able to finish, with several requiring medical evacuation. Of the 14 who began, 6 completed the trek including the 80-year-old.

Despite the hardships, their determination raised an amazing \$60,250, which was then matched by the Gates Foundation, making a total of \$120,500 to End Polio Now.

Brian, a seasoned distance runner, said the hardest adjustment was learning to walk slowly. With no roads, every supply had to be carried by Sherpas or animals, all against the backdrop of truly spectacular Himalayan views.

It was wonderful to be joined by members of the <u>Rotary Club of Kurri Kurri</u>, the <u>Rotary Club of Singleton</u> and <u>Rotary Club of Singleton Sunrise</u> who came along to hear Brian's inspirational story.






